

The Centre Hosts Signing of Historic Agreement

The Centre for Cerebral Palsy recently provided the backdrop for the signing of a historic agreement between the Commonwealth and State Governments that provides the foundation for the trial of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) in Western Australia.

The signing was held during a tour of The Centre's Goodwill Engineering where Prime Minister Tony Abbott and Premier Colin Barnett met with Goodwill's staff and employees.


The Centre for Cerebral Palsy's CEO Judy Hogben said the signing was a historic and transformational event that had required great leadership from both the Commonwealth and State Governments.

"The significance of a NDIS on the lives and needs of people with disability meant that caution and time needed to be taken to get this right," Ms Hogben said.

People with disability in Western Australia can now look forward to real choice as a result of the Commonwealth and State Government's decision to trial both the My Way and NDIS programs here in WA Ms Hogben said.

"I thank the Prime Minister and the Premier for their courage and will to listen, to be flexible, and to adopt the duel trial methodology of both programs here in WA."

The new village which will be home to 25 people across five architecturally designed homes is due to open in the coming weeks. In addition to state of the art features such as individual climate controlled bedrooms, motorised window furnishings and personal courtyards, each home will also feature a designer's touch JUO, a Perth-based boutique building and interior design practice lead by internationally awarded building designer Kerry Jacobs and interior designer Simon Jacobs, have donated their time and expertise to the interior design of the central living areas in each of the five homes.

A major feature of the new village is the Community Garden, which will boast raised garden beds and accessible garden benches to enable gardeners of all abilities to participate in the garden. It will also house native plants, sensory specific plantings and produce for use in cooking homemade meals.

Gladys Newton School's Cadet Group and the Opportunities' Alternatives to Employment Program will assist in maintaining the garden, however it will be community support that will enable the garden to continue to flourish. For parents and carers of children with severe disabilities, a good night's sleep is vital to be able to cope with the physical demands of daily care. Sleep also affects a child's growth and development, as well as their general health, making it especially important for children with disability.

Unfortunately, getting a good night's sleep isn't always easy.

Depending on the disability, restricted movement and limited physical control can make night-long comfort and breathing difficult. Often children with disabilities wake many times during the night, and need help before they can get back to sleep.

Our Sleep Solutions team offers clinical support to help with the management of sleep difficulties, and also provide postural support aides, to give comfort and support as needed. Our current fundraising appeal hopes to raise enough money to purchase a new van for our team, as well as to upgrade our equipment.

This important service is currently being run out of our therapists' car, and we are struggling to cope with demand. To help many more families who so desperately need their sleep, we urgently need to purchase a van, which will make the service more efficient; our equipment is also in need of replacement.

Natalie—whose six-year-old son Cameron has spastic quadriplegia (a type of cerebral palsy) and also epilepsy—understands the value of a good night's rest.

In August last year, Cameron had an operation to insert metal plates into his hips, which were dislocating. Natalie wasn't expecting the major disruption this caused to Cameron's sleep: "It's fair to say I haven't had a good night's sleep since last August. Cameron can sometimes wake up to 15 times in a night, and when he does he is hysterical."

Cameron's recovery from the operation had limited his ability to reposition himself. When he moved during the night, he found himself pressing on his recovering hips. The pain would wake him, and, unable to move himself, he became very upset.

Support aides, extra cushioning and special bedding, really can make all the difference. As Natalie explains: "The Sleep Solutions team has been fantastic."

"They provided us with an underlay to take some of the pressure off, and they have also fitted Cameron with latex pillows that are shaped in a way to keep his legs well positioned. **Their help and their advice have been priceless."**

For Cameron, the comfort and support he has received has taken away much of the pressure and pain that he was experiencing nightly, before the Sleep Solutions team was able to tailor a unique bedding solution to his body.
